# **Course Information**

**Course Description:** This course explores the full impact of Hollywood filmmaking as an art form, economic force, and cultural indicator. It explores the deeper meaning of American movies-the hidden

messages of genres, the social and psychological effects of Hollywood film style, and the mutual influence of society and popular culture. Students will engage in textual analysis and comparative analysis, utilizing film excerpts and entire movies as tools, and supporting their ideas with research. The course includes analysis of theme, symbolism, historical and cultural context, and cinematic elements such as cinematography, visual and sound design, and directing.

### **Major Course Objective:**

Students will analyze American films from a variety of decades and genres.

Primary Common Learning Outcome Assessed: Critical Thinking

#### **Educational Learning Outcomes:**

- Students will be able to examine the narrative elements common to Hollywood films.
- Students will be able to explain the major trends and turning points in the evolution of American cinema.
- Students will be able to analyze the cinematic and literary elements that characterize the film form.
- Students will be able to compare and contrast films within and across genres/subgenres.

**Prerequisite(s):** A minimum grade of C- in ENG 105 or an equivalent composition course at another college or university with a minimum grade of C-
